PROJECTS DESCRIPTIONS

Detailed descriptions of the projects are in the course packet.

1. STORIES (70 pts. total)

Stories are arranged so the requirements become more difficult as the semester progresses. Stories include:

- ✓personal (3-5 min.), ✓oral tradition (5-7 min.), ✓fantasy (6-8 min.),
- ✓ published biography (7-9 min.)

Tellers are required to speak on their assigned day. If you can't make your scheduled performance, you must contact me **prior** to missing your telling date preferably by speaking to me directly. If you do not tell on your assigned date and <u>if</u> there is time to make up your story, **6** pts. will be deducted from your score. THERE ARE NO EXCEPTIONS.

All reasonable attempts will be made to accommodate missed performances, however, time is limited & missing your telling date may result in a zero.

2. TELLING GUIDES (5 pts. each)

You'll write a one-two page telling guide for each story. Telling guides are <u>due</u> in class before you tell your story. Each guide is different. Guides must be typed, double-spaced with one-inch margins, using 12 pt. font. Use proper spelling, grammar, and organization. *Please keep a backup copy of your work.* Late or hand written telling guides will not be accepted under any circumstance.

3. SELF EVALUATION (5 pts. each)

You will evaluate your performance for the following stories: *personal, oral tradition, & fantasy.* Self-examination papers help you analyze your performance and must be turned in the next class session following your story. Self-evaluation forms are located in your course packet. Use proper spelling, grammar, and punctuation. Please keep a backup copy of your work. Two points will be subtracted each class period an evaluation is turned in late.

*Note: If I have trouble reading the first paragraph of any paper you submit in class, I will stop reading and you will earn a zero.

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GRADING

I grade by points and you only ADD them! Figure out your grade at any time during the semester by:

- 1- Adding the total number of points you have earned.
- 2- Dividing that number by the total number of points possible at <u>that time</u>.
- 3- Multiplying that total by 100, which will give you a percentage. I go by a straight scale 100-90% = A, 89-80% = B, and so forth.

For example, at the end of the first month, Student A has earned 21 pts. The total number of points at this stage in the semester is 25. When she divides 21 by 25, she gets .84. Then she multiplies .84 by 100, which equals 84%. She is earning a B <u>at this point</u> in the semester. If you need help, I'm happy to lend a hand!

Final Grading Scale - There is no grading curve. The final grade you <u>earn</u> will be based on the following scale:

200-180 = A

179-160 = B

169-140 = C

139-120 = D

119-0 = F

Grades are earned not negotiated.

4. TESTS (40 pts. total)

Exams are based on textbook & class discussions. Refer to the semester outline for ch. specifics. You will need to bring an 815-E scantron, blank piece of paper, and a #2 pencil. I will administer a makeup exam comprised of all essays questions. You'll need to arrange a time with me before taking a makeup exam <u>during my office hours</u>. Each student is allowed to makeup one exam.

5. PEER EVALUATIONS (5 pts. each)

You will evaluate two peers for the following stories: *oral tradition, fantasy, and biography*. Peer evaluation forms are located in your course packet and are graded on depth and breadth of your feedback. These critiques are designed to test your knowledge of the subject matter and if you can apply it to a specific performance.

Here is how the process will work:

- ✓When others tell their stories in class, you need to be at least 2 min. early. I start EXACTLY on time. If you do not arrive in time to receive a peer evaluation, then you will forfeit these points.
- ✓You will NOT evaluate a peer the day you tell.
- ✓ If you do not submit two peer evaluation forms when I collect them, you will forfeit your chance to evaluate a peer and 10 points.
- ✓Peer evaluations must be completed and submitted in class the same day you evaluate your peer to earn credit.

6. OUTSIDE STORYTELLING PERFORMANCE (10 pts.)

You will perform outside of class. You arrange where you will perform, but you must get the venue approved by me **BEFORE** your performance. After your performance, you will write a paper assessing your experience. Papers are due one week after you tell.

7. PARTICIPATION (15 pts.)

The course is comprised of classroom discussions, activities, and performances. You are encouraged to bring your personal insights into the classroom and use class concepts to understand and evaluate your own experiences.

15 Pts.: You will earn **1 pt.** <u>each</u> class session when you do ALL of the following:

- ✓ Create a supportive atmosphere by treating everyone w/respect.
- ✓ Come to class on time with your electronic devices put away.
- ✓ Verbally participate by demonstrating your knowledge of the course concepts, asking questions, or giving constructive feedback.

CLASS POLICIES

- 1. **Due Dates**: All assignments are due at the beginning of class on the due date. Points will be deducted for late projects. <u>I will not accept any late project one week after the due date or the week before/during finals.</u>
- 2. Unique Academic Needs: If you have a physical, psychiatric, emotional, medical, or learning disability that may affect your ability to carry out assigned course work, please contact the staff in Disability Services (DS), in Journalism 152, phone 575-6225. DS will review your concerns and determine, with you, what accommodations are appropriate. All information is confidential. Please feel free to let me know how I can help too.
- 3. Academic Integrity: You're too smart to cheat.
 Furthermore, I trust you.
 However, if you are thinking about it, please familiarize yourself with the college policies. At the minimum, you will receive a failing grade for the assignment. As a reminder, plagiarism is claiming someone else's ideas or wording is your own. There is no need to cheat. I'm more than willing to help you succeed in class.
- 4. **Schedule**: We will try to stay to the schedule; however, we may alter it if necessary. If you are absent, it is your responsibility for finding out what you missed.

If you do not contribute positively, stay silent, arrive late, or use an electronic device in class, you will not earn participation point for that class session. You will also not earn them if you are absent.

Tardy/Leaving early: If you are late and/or leave early more than **3 times**, you will be dropped. This behavior is disruptive and disrespectful. If you are late, enter quietly and participate actively once you understand our conversation. Do not disrupt your classmates. Arriving late or leaving early will result in a zero for your participation score for that class period.

Absence: If you miss more than **2 classes**, you will be dropped from this course. There are NO exceptions.

SKYDRIVE
